

## Establishing Positive Mentoring Relationships

Successful mentoring happens when mentors and mentees are prepared and invest in building a positive relationship with each other. While mentoring programs and purposes differ, they all share the goal of facilitating the professional development of mentees. The following guidelines can help provide focus and direction to ensure the mentorship gets off to the right start.

### Resources to Support the First Meeting

Both the mentor and mentee need to go into the first meeting with the intention of fully committing to the relationship. The mentee should come prepared with professional goals to guide the collegial conversation and the mentor should also reflect on their goals for the mentoring relationship. Together, mentors and mentees will use these as a basis to provide structure, focus, and momentum to the mentoring relationship.
